Summary

This report seeks to give the Board an overview of the position of the Medway and Swale Health and Care Partnerships Population Health Management Programme and integration with the wider system. The report seeks to highlight key issues arising from the Health and Care Partnership surrounding funding and fair share allocation.

- 2.1. Reduction of health inequalities and promotion of population health are areas of priority for Health and Wellbeing Boards, which are also 2 of the 4 core purposes for Integrated Care Systems (ICSs).
- 2.2. There is no current impact on budgets for financial flows, however, the finance work undertaken as part of the Population Health Management Development Programme may identify financial flow opportunities to support the delivery of an outcome-based approach.

- 3.1. The Medway and Swale Health and Care Partnership has been working on a Population Health Management Programme since 2021, seeking to reduce health inequalities and work towards a system wide movement into the Wider Determinants of Health.
