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Summary

This report advises the committee of the petitions presented to the Mayor at Council meetings including a summary of officer's response to the petitioners.

1. Budget and Policy Framework

1.1 The constitution provides that petitions presented at Council meetings relating to matters within the remit of an Overview and Scrutiny Committee will be referred immediately to the relevant Director for consideration at officer level.

2. Background

- 2.1 Where the Director is able to fully meet the request of the petitioners a response is sent of the proposed action and timescales for implementation. The petition organiser may request to refer the matter to the relevant Overview and Scrutiny Committee if s/he is not satisfied with the answer and has given reasons for their dissatisfaction.
- 2.2 For petitions where the Director is unable to meet the request of petitioners or where there are a range of alternative responses the petition will be referred to the next relevant Overview and Scrutiny Committee for discussion.

3. Petitions

3.1 A summary of responses relevant to this Committee that have passed the ten day deadline for a request for referral to the Committee and are therefore seen as acceptable to the petitioners are set out below.

4 Petitions referred to this committee

4.1 The following petition was referred to the Committee for consideration as petitioners were dis-satisfied with the response they received.

Further e-mail: the gating of these alleyways was revisited under the Clean Neighbourhood & Environment Act 2005 (Scheme 5028). This allows the Council to gate Public alleyways providing there is sufficient evidence of antisocial behaviour, arson, etc from our partners in the Police, Kent Fire & Rescue Service and the Council's Community Safety team. Unfortunately the level of reported incidents did not support this case and therefore this proposal will not go ahead.

5 Directors comments

- 5.1 Through the Council's published alley-gating policy two separate ways were investigated to see whether the alleyways in question could be gated.
- 5.2 The first was to contact the properties having a direct access onto the alleyways, to ascertain if there was majority support for considering the stopping up of a public right of way. Out of 62 relevant houses, only 19 responded positively. This effectively meant that consideration was not required by the Highways Department to ascertain the current necessity and use of the route as a public right of way. However, had this stage been reached, anecdotally officers were advised that evidence would have been supplied showing that this was a well established right of way, enjoying regular use.
- 5.3 The scheme was then considered under new powers contained within the Clean Neighbourhoods and Environment Act 2005, which could allowed the temporary closure of the alleyway, provided that evidence was available to show that it contributed to a level of anti-social behaviour that was disproportionate to that found in the locality. Evidence was sought from Kent Police, Kent Fire and Rescue Service, the Health Service and Medway's Safer Communities Service to see if reported incidents of anti-social behaviour supported closure. Unfortunately this was not the case and a scheme could therefore not be forwarded under the powers of the act.
- 5.4 The cost of installation of this scheme would be approximately £5,125 but, as detailed above, there is no evidence that supports the installation of gates at this location.
- 5.5 Officers are however, happy to engage with the community either through the Partners and Communities Together (PACT) initiative or through other routes to see if other remedies are available to improve environmental or other conditions in the area.

6 Financial and Legal Implications

7 Recommendation
