Summary

The report invites consideration of this year's Annual Monitoring Report (AMR) in advance of it being reported to Cabinet on 15 December 2009.

1. Budget and Policy Framework

- 1.1 The Annual Monitoring Report is in accordance with the Policy Framework and its submission to Government is a matter for the Cabinet. It has no direct budget implications.
- 1.2 The AMR refers to a number of areas that are covered by national indicators included in the LAA these include NI 154 (Net New homes).

2. Background

- 2.1 In accordance with the Planning and Compulsory Purchase Act 2004 all local planning authorities are required to submit to Government an Annual Monitoring Report by the end of December each year. This must include key monitoring information related to the development plan and is intended to demonstrate what progress has been made and what policies may require review.
- 2.2 This is Medway's fifth Annual Monitoring Report, the full document comprises of two volumes. Volume one is the main report while volume two contains detailed tables and schedules providing the evidence from which the conclusions in the first volume are drawn. 2.3 The format of the draft Annual Monitoring Report centres on a number of indicators that are laid out in guidance issued by the Department for Communities and Local Government. The period covered by the report is 1 April 2008 to 31 March 2009.

3. Options

3.1 As indicated above, there is a statutory requirement to submit the Annual Monitoring Report by the due date and information contained within it is used to calculate Housing and Planning Delivery Grant. It is also a standard reference for external inspections of the Council's services. A failure to submit by the due date would therefore have serious implications.

4. Advice and analysis

- 4.1 The main finding of this years Annual Monitoring Report are summarised below.
- 4.2 Medway had the highest number of annual housing completions on record in 2008/09 at 914. This is well above the target set out in the South East Plan and is particularly encouraging bearing in mind the extreme economic difficulties experienced over the latter part of this period, which have had a huge impact on house building elsewhere.
- 4.3 With a healthy number of dwellings under construction all indications are that this positive trend should continue this year but may fall off in 2010/11 if there is no early general economic recovery.
- 4.4 The proportion of development on previously developed land was higher than last year at 51%. It will further increase over the next few years as greenfield housing allocations dating from the Medway Local Plan 2003 are built out.
- 4.5 A significantly higher proportion of new dwellings were affordable units, around 45%, compared to just over a quarter in the previous year. This resulted from open market purchases and increased development by registered social landlords.
- 4.6 The amount of household waste produced decreased by 6% while the recycling rate was up on last year.
- 4.7 Three sites were submitted for Green Flag status in 2008, Riverside Country Park, The Vines and Hillyfields. All reached the required standard.

5. Risk Management

5.1 As the Annual Monitoring Report is a factual account of performance achieved there are no specific risks associated with its production but it is important that it is submitted to GOSE by the required date.

6. Financial and legal implications
