

2012/13 Activities

Priority 1 - Tackle Substance and Alcohol Abuse

1. More than 1000 individual public interactions per year to raise awareness of the problem of illegal tobacco.

RAG status: Amber/Green

2. Develop integrated alcohol care pathway between primary and secondary care, to reduce repeat admissions for alcohol

RAG status: Green

3. Deliver Identification and Brief Advice training to increase the number of alcohol screens delivered, targeting GP practices.

RAG Status: Green


- Reduce the proportion of drug users that leave treatment successfully (free of drug dependence) and represent to treatment services within 6 months to less than 13 %.

Proportion who successfully completed treatment in the first 6 months of the latest 12 month period and re-presented within 6 months





Priority 3 - Reducing Re-offending

- Reduction of 32.7% in re-offending by the adult IOM cohort.

Kent reduction 0.9%.

- Reduction of 62.2% in re-offending by a static cohort of DYO's (Deter Young Offenders).

Kent increase 41.8%.


- Achieved a predicted re-offending rate of 9.0% between January and December 2012.

(This is a vast improvement on the same period in 2011 when the Medway re-offending rate was 6.19% higher than predicted).




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Youth Offending




- Post 16`s in training or Education the target was 70% - actual 89%.
- Young offenders in suitable accommodation, target 95%, achieved 98%.
- Reducing re-offending by those already in the YJS, target no more than 50% actual 38%.
- Reducing re-offending by those receiving a prevention service, target less than 50%, actual 11%.
- Medway YOT leading on Kent/Medway protocol to reduce impact of Looked after Children in YJS.




ASB per 1,000 population






