MEDWAY SAFEGUARDING CHILDREN BOARD (MSCB) UPDATE REPORT

Summary

The purpose of this report is to update the Health and Wellbeing Board on the work of the Medway Safeguarding Children Board (MSCB) and to provide members with an update on the Peer Review of the MSCB undertaken in February 2015.

1. Budget and Policy Framework

- 1.1 The Medway Safeguarding Children Board (MSCB) is set up under the Children Act 2004 and has the following main objectives:
 - To coordinate what is done by each agency represented on the Board for the purposes of safeguarding and promoting the welfare of children in Medway
 - To ensure the effectiveness of what is done by those agencies for that purpose
- 1.2 The MSCB has a pooled budget made up from financial contributions from its constituent statutory partners:
 - Medway Council
 - Medway Clinical Commissioning Group
 - Kent Police & Crime Commissioner
 - National Probation Service
 - Kent, Surrey & Sussex Community Rehabilitation Company
 - HM Young Offenders Institution Cookham Wood
 - Medway Secure Training Centre
 - Children And Families Court Advisory and Support Service (CAFCASS).

2. Background

2.1 The MSCB comprises an Executive, a Board and a number of Sub Groups.

The Executive is the main business forum ensuring MSCB maintains its main

focus on the strategic priorities that impact on safeguarding and promoting the welfare of children in Medway. The day-to-day work of the Board is managed through the sub group structure. The Executive, Board and its sub groups are supported by the MSCB Staff Team, who are employed by Medway Council and based in Gun Wharf.

- 2.2 The MSCB appointed a new Independent Chair in December 2014. John Drew C.B.E. took over from the previous Independent Chair Eleanor Brazil who stood down in December 2014. Eleanor Brazil had been the Chair since May 2013. John Drew chairs both the Executive and the Board meetings.
- 2.3 The MSCB has agreed six priority areas for 2014-17. The priorities identified below are delivered through the detailed work of each of the MSCB sub groups. The priority areas are:
 - To reduce the negative impact on children and young people living with family members with Mental Health, Substance Misuse or Disabilities;
 - To develop and implement a strategy for co-ordination and provision of support for children subjected to, or at risk of, sexual exploitation;
 - To educate children and young people to recognise risk factors to their own, and to their peers, safety and wellbeing;
 - To reduce the negative impact on children and young people who live with Domestic Abuse;
 - To develop understanding of factors that make children and young people more vulnerable aged 11 and over; and
 - To improve MSCB communications.
- 2.4 The MSCB Action and Improvement Plan sets out detailed actions under each of the six priority areas. In line with the protocol agreed with the Health and Wellbeing Board in October 2014, a copy of the draft MSCB Action and Improvement Plan for 2014-17 is attached at Appendix A. The draft Action and Improvement Plan is due for sign off at the next MSCB Executive meeting.
- 2.5 The MSCB Independent Chair is required to publish an annual report on the effectiveness of child safeguarding and promoting the welfare of children in the local area. The 2014-15 Annual Report is currently in development and will be approved by the MSCB Executive and Board in September 2015. A copy of the MSCB Annual Report 2014-15 will be presented to the Health and Wellbeing Board following sign off.

3. Local Government Association (LGA) Peer Review

- 3.1 In February 2015 the MSCB took part in a Local Government Association (LGA) Peer Review. The purpose of the Peer Review was to provide an objective and external perspective on the effectiveness and impact of the MSCB on safeguarding and protecting children in order to identify areas requiring improvement.
- 3.2 The team of four Peer Reviewers and an LGA Manager were on site for three days and met with members of the MSCB, individually and in groups, as well as sub group members and other partners. This followed a review of key documents. The formal feedback from the Peer Review team was received in

June 2015. In their feedback, the Peer Review team identified the following strengths:

- Good attendance at Board and Executive meetings and a strong commitment to safeguarding from partners
- Protocols in place for MSCB, Medway Children's Action Network (CAN) and Health and Wellbeing Board
- MSCB website updated and monthly MSCB Bulletin
- Engagement with children and young people
- Good, comprehensive policies and procedures are in place with timely updates
- Multi-agency training is well received and supported
- Good practice for children and young people who go missing
- Optimism about the future
- 3.3 The Peer Review team made a number of recommendations, many of which had already been identified by MSCB as key areas of focus for 2015. The MSCB Executive is developing a Response Plan to address the areas for development from the Peer Review which will be incorporated into the Action and Improvement Plan. The following progress has already been made since the Peer Review:
- 3.4 **Evidence of Challenge -** One of the key roles of the MSCB is to challenge partners on the effectiveness of their safeguarding activity. The Peer Reviewers commented that the Board needs to more effectively evidence its challenge role. As a result, the MSCB Executive has introduced a challenge log to evidence how it demonstrates challenges to partners on their responsibilities, and members of the Board have been encouraged to adopt a more direct approach at meetings.
- 3.5 **Multi-agency Early Help –** As part of its duties to assess the effectiveness of early help services being provided in Medway, the Board has recently considered the updated Early Help Strategy. The Board endorsed the strategy, which is overseen by Medway CAN, and will receive regular progress reports including an update report at the Board meeting in September 2015. The MSCB Chair is a member of the Medway CAN Board and so also exercises his challenge role to ensure the effectiveness and comprehensiveness of early help services through that meeting.
- 3.6 Voice of Children and Young People Since 2014, the MSCB Board meetings have started with a "voice of the child" item and MSCB has facilitated a number of forums and workshops to engage young people. In order to embed the engagement of young people further into the work of MSCB, the Board has set up a Young Person's Safeguarding Panel to enable young people to have a platform where they can raise issues and concerns around safeguarding in a way that enables them to have a direct link to MSCB. The first meeting of the Young Person's Safeguarding Panel is in June 2015 and includes representatives from the Youth Parliament, Children in Care Council, Care Leavers Group, Children's Disability Group, Mid Kent

- College and Medway Youth Trust. The Panel will also engage the (soon to be appointed) MSCB Lay Members.
- 3.7 **Implementation of Quality Assurance Framework –** The MSCB has recently updated its Quality Assurance Framework. The revised framework addresses the ways in which MSCB ensures effectiveness using an outcomes based accountability approach.
- 3.8 In addition to the programme of agency annual reports presented to the Board, Section 11 Audits, Case Reviews and the MSCB dataset, the framework sets out the programme of multi-agency themed audits.

4. Risk management

4.1 Whilst there are no specific risks identified, the MSCB annual report 2014-15 will present an analysis of safeguarding in Medway and work to challenge and support the Council and its other partners to address and reduce risks to children.

5. Financial and Legal implications

5.1 MSCB is a statutory body funded through financial and "in kind" contributions from local agencies. There are no financial or legal implications for the Board arising from this report.

6. Recommendations

6.1 The Board is asked to consider the contents of the update report and provide any comments on the draft MSCB Action and Improvement Plan.
