As we have clearly said through the consultation, changes to Education and Skills Funding Agency (ESFA) regulations introduced from April 2017 require local authorities to pass to providers (nurseries and schools) a minimum of 93% of the early years block of the Dedicated Schools Grant (DSG). From 2018, the minimum will be 95%. This leaves the centrally retained spend within Medway's Early Years, including Children's Centres, at £1.982m. The current service cost is £3.584m, presenting a £1.602m budget gap. |
