### 1 Summary description of the proposed change

Medway Infant Feeding Strategy has been refreshed updating the previous 2011 strategy.

The refreshed strategy has revised priority areas and targets, with the Strategy Group requiring wider partner support to positively affect infant feeding levels in Medway.

### 2 Summary of evidence used to support this assessment

The strategy was refreshed by an independent consultant and was scrutinised by the multi-agency infant feeding strategy group to ensure that it was fair, robust and that partners could sign up to the strategy.

The multi-agency Infant Feeding Strategy group has developed a wide range of interventions and projects based on both local and national best practice and evidence and NICE guidance

This in order to positively influence breastfeeding rates and other positive infant feeding practices within Medway. Despite these efforts, breastfeeding initiation and continuation rates have remained static for the last 5 years.

The strategy was also informed by a significant piece of consultation and engagement work undertaken independently by national charity Best Beginnings.

The proposed strategy has the following key aims and impacts

- A year on year increase in breastfeeding initiation and continuation rates, aiming for a 1% uplift per year
- 80% of babies discharged from the neonatal unit receive some breast milk
- All parents are supported to build close relationships with their babies
- Parents are satisfied with the support they receive and able to follow their chosen method of infant feeding
- Breastfeeding is an achievable option for all families, but parents who choose to formula feed are supported to do so



- responsively
- Medway as a place becomes a more infant feeding friendly environment
- Solid food is offered to infants after 6 months of age, with continued breastfeeding for the first year and beyond
- Increased uptake of Healthy Start vitamins from 2017 baseline.

The multi-agency Infant Feeding Strategy Group ensures that key partners are engaged in the strategy and that there are clear communication channels regarding the potential changes.

The strategy can only work if all of the key stakeholders work together (Medway Council, MCH, MFT, and Community Organisations). Regular attendance at Strategy Group meetings indicates ongoing commitment of partners to improving outcomes around infant feeding.

Use of the recently developed Beside You campaign also supports a digital element to the strategy to ensure that information and advice is available through a variety of mediums. This campaign included a significant piece of consultation and engagement with medway families
