# **CAPITAL BUDGET MONITORING 2018/19 – QUARTER 3**

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# Summary

This report presents the results of the Council's capital monitoring for Q3 of the 2018/19 financial year, including out-turn forecasts and reference to any new schemes for approval.

# 1. Budget and Policy Framework

1.1 Cabinet are responsible for ensuring that expenditure for each capital scheme remains within the budget approved by Council.

# 2. Background

2.1 The approved capital programme for 2018/19 is £228.930million. This report consolidates the capital expenditure forecasts for the third quarter and Appendix 1 provides a scheme by scheme forecast position for the whole programme. The report also provides details of any additions to the capital programme since the Quarter 2 monitoring report.

# 3. Forecast position at quarter 3

3.1 Table 1 summarises the overall capital programme and the latest forecast position:

# 3.3 The overspend on Children and Adults of £583,000 relates to variances on four schemes:

- Halling Primary Capacity Increase value engineering throughout the project is forecast to result in an underspend of £21,000 which will be transferred back to the Basic Need Programme.
- Family Hubs and Wellbeing Centre works required to bring the Elaine Centre up to the required standard to deliver the services previously provided at Bligh resulted in a forecast overspend of £50,000. This will be funded by a revenue contribution to capital.
- Condition Programme an overspend of £234,000 is forecast as condition programme funding has been used to deliver SEN works at Bradfield's (£150,000) and Thomas Aveling (£84,000), however an increase in the High Needs Special School Place Provision Capital allocation received by the Council has not yet reflected in the budget; as such the budget for this scheme will be increased and will not represent an overspend at year end.
- Children & Adults Mobile Working the overspend of £299,000 relates to the cost of the prudential borrowing taken out to fund the purchase of mobile devices. In November, Cabinet recommended to Council in January that this be added to the capital programme (decision no. 147/2018 refers).
- 3.4 The forecast overspend of on Regeneration, Culture, Environment and Transformation relates to a forecast overspend of £122,000 on the Command of the Heights Phase 2 scheme. Section 106 contributions have been identified that can be used to fund this overspend, for which the Chief Finance Officer will seek agreement from the Leader of the Council to add to the capital programme in accordance with Chapter 4, Part 6, Paragraph 3.7 of Medway Council's Constitution (Financial Rules).

# 4. New schemes and virements

- 4.1 In the Quarter 2 Capital Budget Monitoring report on 20 November 2018, Cabinet recommended to the January Meeting of the Full Council that the following additions to the capital programme be made (decision no.s 147/2018 to 149/2018 refer):
  - Children and Adults Mobile Working £299,000;
  - Medway Adult Education's Management Information System £33,000;
  - Shared Licensing Service addition of £11,000 to make a scheme of £34,000; and
  - Capital grant to RVS up to £25,000.

- 4.2 At its meeting on 18 December 2018, Cabinet recommended to the January Meeting of the Full Council that the following further additions to the capital programme be made (decision no.s 158/2018 and 159/2018 refer):
  - Independent ASD Special School at the Cornwallis Site £24.7million;
  - Local Transport Capital Funding Allocation for 2018/19 £1.128million;
  - Market Hall Multi-storey Car Park infrastructure works £505,393;
  - Family Hubs and Wellbeing Centre £50,000; and
  - CCTV Hardware £80,000.

### 5. Risk management

5.1 The report provides detailed information regarding individual schemes and no significant risks have been identified to the current programme.

# 6. Financial and legal implications

6.1 The financial implications are fully analysed in the report. There are no direct legal implications to this report.

#### 7. Recommendation

7.1 Cabinet are asked to note the spending forecasts summarised at Table 1 of the report.

# 8. Suggested reasons for decision

8.1 Cabinet has the responsibility to ensure effective budgetary control to contain expenditure within the approved limits set by Council.
