CHIEF EXECUTIVE USING URGENCY POWERS 13 MAY 2020

ADDITION TO THE REVENUE BUDGET

Summary

This report seeks the Chief Executive's approval, using urgency powers, to approve the addition of further Covid-19 grant funding, made available by the Ministry of Housing, Communities and Local Government (MHCLG), to the Council's revenue budget.

1. Budget and policy framework

- 1.1. It is the responsibility of Cabinet to ensure that expenditure remains within the budgets approved by the Council, but it remains the responsibility of Council to approve additions to the Capital Programme and Revenue Budget.
- 1.2. Therefore, it is proposed that the Chief Executive uses the urgency provisions as set out in paragraph 4.1 of the Employee Delegation Scheme (including consultation with the Leader of the Council and the Leader of the Labour Group) to agree an addition to the revenue budget funded from grant provided by Central Government. The use of these urgency provisions will be reported to Full Council on 16 July 2020 for information.

2. Background

- 2.1 On 31 March 2020 the Chief Executive used the urgency provisions as set out in paragraph 4.1 of the Employee Delegation Scheme to add the £6.628 million of Covid-19 emergency funding from the government to the Council's budget for 2019/20.
- 2.2 A further £1.6billion of additional funding was announced on 18 April 2020 to help Councils to deal with the immediate impacts of coronavirus. The funding is not ring-fenced, recognising that local authorities are best placed to decide how this money is spent. From this national funding, Medway Council has

been allocated £7,648,146. Expenditure against this grant will be carefully monitored and the Finance division have set up a range of cost centres to capture and record this spend.

2.3 The Chief Executive is requested to approve the addition of this funding to the 2020/21 revenue budget under urgency powers.

- 6.1 That the Chief Executive (using urgency powers (in place of referring this matter to Full Council)) agrees to add £7,648,146 to help the Council to deal with the impacts of coronavirus, funded from grant provided by Central Government, to the 2020/21 revenue budget.
- 6.2 The use of these urgency provisions will be reported to Full Council on 16 July 2020 for information.
