


1 Births

- New housing is likely to increase the number of births in the future




2 Pre-school

- This figure is likely to increase as more new housing is built






Peninsula West - Primary







Peninsula West is a largely rural area which covers six primary schools which have been filled to capacity since 2015. This pressure is forecasted to ease after 2021 on reception rolls, but the bulk of Medway's new housing is being targeted in this planning area and this is impacting on total roll numbers. Some of these developments have been approved and are underway, but there are still more to come and so are not yet included in the forecast.

Hundred of Hoo Academy added a 1 FE primary phase in 2015, with the option to expand to 2 FE. This project is now being pursued to provide additional capacity in Hoo from September 2023 to cope with demand from local new housing. Further large housing developments are expected to provide new primary provision.





Peninsula East - Primary






Peninsula East is a rural area, with a small number of villages and two primary schools. There are, and forecast to be, sufficient spare places to cater for immediate demand.


There are currently sufficient places in this area. The schools are rural schools, isolated from each other, and generally serve the villages and communities they are in.

Stoke and Allhallows schools merged on 31 August 2021. This reduced the Reception PAN by 20, and the overall capacity by 140. This removed unused excess capacity in the area, which was not useful in meeting demand from Peninsula West as the schools are too far away.



Strood - Primary






Rolls are forecasted to reduce from 2021 onwards due to the falling birth rate. However, there are several large housing developments planned, which will have an impact on future rolls. These do not yet have planning permission and so are not included in the forecast.


Plans are in place to change St Nicholas Infant school to a primary school from September 2023. Currently the PAN as an infant school is 40, this will reduce to 30 as a primary school. Pupils currently transfer from St Nicholas to Gordon Juniors. To complement the change at St Nicholas, Gordon Infants and Gordon Juniors will amend their PANs to 60. This will result in a net removal of 70 places (10 per year group).

Rochester is a mainly urban area, with varying degrees of affluence and deprivation. It shares a boundary with Chatham planning area and we see significant cross boundary movement between schools. The schools in Rochester are generally on restricted sites with little or no space for expansion. Given the proximity to Chatham, we look at combined solutions for the demand on places. A large 1400 dwelling housing scheme is underway. Rochester Riverside school is planned to open in 2022, in temporary accommodation, to cater for pupils from the development.


Crest Infant School has reduced its PAN from 90 to 60 for 2022, and St peters has reduced from 40 to 30. Delce Academy will no longer admit reception pupils and current infant classes will be phased out as they progress to the junior phase.

Walderslade - Primary






Gillingham is a densely populated urban area. The area is largely deprived, with pockets of relative affluence.


Napier has reduced its PAN from 90 to 60 for the academic year 2022/23. This will be reviewed annually.





Rainham South - Primary



Parkwood Primary will reduce its PAN from 90 to 60 from 2022.







Pupil numbers in non-selective secondary schools in Medway had been declining. This trend has reversed, with larger cohorts currently in primary schools transferring to secondary. As a result, there is pressure on year 7 places. There has been sufficient capacity within the system to cater for the increased demand, however within two years overall capacity will become an issue and solutions to cater for demand will be required. Two new secondary free schools have been approved in Medway, one of which opened in 2021. These will help ease pressure in the medium to longer term. A number of bulge classes were required due to delays in the opening of the new academies, which but additional pressure on existing non-selective schools. Lack of funding is the principle barrier to ensuring sufficient places are available to meet demand as it increases.


A new free school, Leigh Academy, opened in Rainham in 2021 (PAN 180 but took a bulge class of 60 pupils resulting in an intake of 240). A second free school, Maritime Academy opened in September 2022 (PAN 180) initially in temporary accommodation while the permanent build in Strood is completed.

Selective - Secondary



Pupil numbers in selective secondary schools in Medway had been declining, but this trend has now reversed, with the larger cohorts in primary schools transferring to secondary. This increase has been greater in selective than non-selective schools, due to pupils travelling from Kent and London to attend selective schools.

We have six selective schools which are all academies. Pressure on Year 7 places has been increasing from 2017. While there has been sufficient capacity available (due to lower rolls in older year groups) to cope for a couple of years, this is not sustainable in the long term. Significant additional capacity will be required to meet expected demand. Lack of funding is the principle barrier to ensuring sufficient places are available to meet demand as it increases.

Expansions have been carried out at several schools between 2015 and 2018 to provide additional places.

Three schools are investigating changing from single gender to co-education, which will improve the balance of boys and girls places, and reduce the number of out of area pupils taking up places.
