What is MEAM



Benefits in the Approach

- An 82% reduction in Rough Sleeping.
- 33% and 49% reductions in A&E attendance and nights in hospital.
- Up to 44% improvements to individuals' wellbeing and circumstances
- Up to 23% related reduction in service use costs
