1. Summary description of the proposed change

The current Medway Infant Feeding Strategy is scheduled for a refresh. Improving infant feeding and improving breastfeeding are strategic priorities for Medway Council and health system partners. The 2023-2028 has been codeveloped with stakeholders and members of the public.

The strategy is proposing six priority goals to improve the nutritional start to life for all medway infants.

2. Summary of evidence used to support this assessment

Detailed consultation has taken place with Medway residents. This includes a series of focus groups and in depth interviews. Data analysis identified the demographics of parents that were least likely to breastfeed. This population were prioritised in the insight recruitment, so that new interventions were targeted to the correct audience.

4. Summary of the likely impacts

The Infant Feeding Strategy and subsequent actions delivered by the multipartner Infant Feeding Strategy group are primarily intended to improve the nutritional start to life for all Medway infants. Interventions are targeted towards the peri-natal period, delivered by midwives, health visitors and other early years professionals. Breastfeeding and introducing healthy solid foods after six months of life has multiple physical and mental health benefits for the infant.

Increasing breastfeeding also has a positive health impact on the mother such as a reduced risk of breast cancer.

The Public Health intelligence team have conducted detailed analysis to understand the lowest breastfeeding rate groups which includes residents with a white British or white other ethnicity. This group will be particularly targeted with new interventions that will be implemented once the strategy is approved.
