I have examined the premises licence application from B&M for Gillingham High Street.

I object to this application as the application does not address the 3 objectives of the Licensing Act 2003:

The Prevention of Crime and Disorder

The Prevention of Public Nuisance

Public Safety

The application is surprising given that the store is in the Cumulative Impact Prevention (CIP) zone as designated by Medway Council. The application does not acknowledge the CIP area.

I have to assume that the Licensing authorities have advised B&M that they have to explain how granting a Premises Licence will add positively to the area.

Gillingham High Street has significant challenges associated with street drinking, both in the street itself and nearby.

To supply alcohol, as could be envisaged with the few controls specified in the application, could cause greater problems in this area.
