<b>1 Summary description of the proposed change</b>
What is the change to policy / service / new project that is being proposed? How does it compare with the current situation?
<p>The Equality Act 2010 (Specific Duties and Public Authorities) Regulations 2017 required all employers with more than 250 employees to report annually on their Gender Pay Gap.</p> <p>The Regulations require Public Authorities to publish their data.</p> <p>Requirements of the Gender Pay Gap legislation</p> <p>Qualifying employers are required to take an annual “snapshot” of their total payroll (for the Public Sector that has been set by the Regulations as 31 March), and report on a number of key metrics, they are:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>• the mean and median hourly gender pay gap;</li> <li>• the mean and median gender bonus gap;</li> <li>• the proportion of men and women receiving a bonus; and</li> <li>• the proportion of men and women in each of four pay quartile bands</li> </ul> <p>An executive summary of the findings is shown below:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>• Male colleagues show a 5.96% higher mean hourly rate which has decreased from 6.9% in 2023 (Data Set G1).</li> <li>• The median hourly rate is 7.93% (Data Set G2).</li> <li>• There is parity amongst male and female colleagues in median bonus pay (Data G4)</li> <li>• The proportion of male employees receiving bonus pay is 2.9% and for females 5.0% (Data Set’s G5)</li> <li>• The proportion of females in each band goes down the higher the pay quartile but significantly increases in the upper quartile for male colleagues (Data Set G6)</li> </ul>
<b>2 Summary of evidence used to support this assessment</b>

This is the eighth year of reporting and a comparison to the 2024 Report shows that the Councils Gender Pay continues to improve.
