The proposed change is the recommended adoption of a new Housing Allocations Policy. This replaces the previous Housing Allocations Policy published in 2018.  The strategy considers legislative requirements from the Housing Act 1996, Section 168 and Section 169.

Pre-Draft workshops delivered between March and April to a range of stakeholders including internal colleagues across housing and public health, registered providers, support providers, voluntary, community sector providers and members of cabinet.  A public consultation is yet to be held and will likely be published Monday 9 <sup>th</sup> June 2025. During this period, housing staff will be holding drop-in sessions at libraries to support people in completing the consultation online.  To supplement the public consultation, an additional focus group has been held with the HRA tenant's panel on 20 <sup>th</sup> May 2025 to tackle some of the more nuanced and complex issues that this policy raises. The draft has been amended based on some of the comments and issues they highlighted.

The Housing Allocations Policy is written in line with government guidance which outlines requirements for certain groups to be provided with reasonable preference. The previous policy already met this criterion however, the updated policy improves opportunities for low-income households to access the register, as well as balancing the criteria set at each banding level.

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All the impacts foreseen by adopting the Allocations Policy 2025 are considered to improve equality of opportunity by e.g. reducing the number of properties subject to transfer without meeting a housing need. There are no anticipated negative impacts on any specific group sharing a protected characteristic. Rather, vulnerable households should see a reduction in time waiting for offers of accommodation. This is expected to impact households needing to access housing through need relating to age and disability, and the higher percentage of women in temporary accommodation (60% nationally female in TA against comprising 51% of the population) and those on low incomes, through increasing the speed with which these households can access social housing.
